We request your social security number on our application for a variety of identity purposes and assure you that we will maintain it with the utmost confidentiality and security. We will assign all students a UD ID number for University ID purposes.

All students with whom we have had previous contact should have received their assigned UD ID number via e-mail. If you have not received your UD ID number, you are not expected to fill out question 7 on the application. Once you have submitted your application, you will receive your UD ID number within an acknowledgment letter. This number will be referenced in future communications with the University and applicant, and will become the student's permanent ID number should they matriculate to the University of Delaware. Students should become familiar with their UD ID number as it will be required on subsequent forms and online interactions.

Application Instructions

1. Students applying for the Over 60 Program to the University of Delaware must be residents of the state of Delaware and should complete this application.
2. Application for admission should be made six to eight weeks before the start of the intended semester. (June/July for fall semester, November/December for spring semester)
3. It is expected that Over 60 applicants will have earned a High School diploma or equivalent (see page 2 of Application). SAT's or other standardized tests are not required.
4. Applicants who have completed prior college work should request that official transcript(s) from the institution(s) be sent directly to the undergraduate Admissions Office.
5. Students in the Over 60 Tuition Free Degree Program are subject to the same fees as all other admitted students with the exception of the following:
 - admission application fee
 - student teaching fee
 - new student orientation fee
6. Registration for classes takes place on a space-available basis.
7. Participants are responsible for buying their own books and for paying late registration charges and fees for other services.

**All students interested in earning a BS in Biological Sciences should apply as Biological Sciences (BA) majors. After completing the required work, students may apply to BS majors as rising juniors.

*Students are first admitted into an interest program. After completing the required prerequisite work, students apply to the major.

**Freshmen only. Students may be admitted to the College before declaring a major. Engineering students will be guided by their advisor during summer orientation toward a major, and should choose a major either in the summer or early in their freshman year. Business students will have until the fall of their sophomore year to declare their major.
